Arts Council of New Orleans and Creative Capital to present arts workshop

The Arts Council of New Orleans and Creative Capital will present a free workshop, *Performance Documentation*, from 9:30 a.m. to 1 p.m. Saturday, Dec. 14, at its office at 935 Gravier St., Suite 850.

This workshop will provide dance, theater, performance and time-based visual artists with an opportunity to improve the documentation and preservation of their work. It will include discussions of best practices for different types of documentation, how to make a strategic plan and how to budget for the documentation process. Artists will learn techniques for personal use or to discuss with editors and videographers to create high-quality performance documentation for use in personal archives, work samples, marketing campaigns and beyond.

CODOFIL opens scholarships to young professionals

The Council for the Development of French in Louisiana will open its scholarship program to young professionals for the first time in 2014. The scholarships, offered by the state agency's international partners in Belgium, France and Canada, have historically been offered to high school students in French, university French majors and minors and K - 12 French teachers. Thanks to a partnership with Université Sainte-Anne in Pointe-de-l'Église, Nova Scotia, two Louisiana professionals will receive a scholarship covering about half the expenses to participate in a five-week summer immersion program.

"As a young professional myself, upon starting at CODOFIL I was approached by so many of my peers expressing a desire to learn French but regretting never having taken the opportunity to do so while in school," Erin Stickney, CODOFIL's communications attaché, said. "We are extremely grateful for the support from the wonderful program at Sainte-Anne. Those wishing to learn French to further their careers or incorporate the language into their work environments should apply for this scholarship."

Nominations sought for inaugural HP excellence awards

The inaugural Louisiana Landmarks Society Awards for Excellence in Historic Preservation will honor projects completed in Orleans Parish (outside of the French Quarter) in 2012 or 2013 that represent outstanding examples of restoration, rehabilitation or new construction in a historic district.

Nominations for the 2014 Awards may be submitted by individuals, companies or organizations on the Louisiana Landmarks Society's website. The deadline for nominations is Jan. 15, 2014. Of particular interest are projects that:

- demonstrate that historic preservation can be a tool to revitalize older neighborhoods.
- show that historic preservation is "green" and sustainable.
- support the cultural and ethnic diversity of the preservation movement.
- are creative examples of saving a historic building.
- involve properties that use various federal or state tax incentive programs.
- represent a new design that is appropriate to historic neighborhoods.

Taking steps to protect historic structures from fire

Officials throughout Louisiana are taking measures to ensure the safety of historic buildings, including elaborate detector systems, wiring inspections and regular walkthroughs by firefighters.

Just this fall, firefighters at the Government Street fire station learned the layout of the Old State Capitol in downtown Baton Rouge. With four stories, hidden staircases, a catwalk, secret roof access, ladders that dip down into crannies and an unearthed jail cell, the historic building is a hide-and-seek player's dream and a logistical nightmare. Firefighters need to be able to nimbly navigate the 151year-old building in case a fire breaks out and the structure fills with smoke."

LeBeau Plantation in Old Arabi destroyed in fire

The LeBeau Plantation house was destroyed in a fire in St. Bernard Parish Nov. 22. The Old Arabi landmark was built in the 1850s and was one of the largest plantations south of New Orleans.

Firefighters were called to the plantation at about 2 a.m. St. Bernard Parish Fire Chief Thomas Stone told FOX 8 that the building was fully engulfed in flames when he arrived on the scene.

Built in 1854, the plantation home has been a private residence, a hotel, a boarding house and an illegal casino.
