High marks for La. Lt. Governor's in National Park Service tax credit report

The National Park Service has released its annual report concerning tax credits for Fiscal Year 2013.

During the fiscal year, Louisiana's historic tax credit programs brought in more than \$367.7 million in direct private investment.

Louisiana is specifically recognized in the report—along with Virginia, Ohio and Missouri—as a leader in stacking state and federal tax credits.

The separate Statistical Report and Analysis contains more high points for the state. Louisiana is ranked ninth in the nation for the amount of dollars invested in Federal Historic Rehabilitation Tax Credit projects. The state ranks fourth in the nation for the number of buildings that have been determined historic for the purposes of the Federal Historic Rehabilitation Tax Credit Program. Louisiana also ranks second in the number of rehabilitation projects planned, as well as third in the nation for the number of rehabilitation projects that were completed and received Federal Historic Rehabilitation Tax Credits.

Music Ambassadors program to continue in 2014

Lt. Governor Jay Dardenne has announced that the Music Ambassador project will continue in 2014. The inaugural year was an enormous success, with the program sponsoring scores of Louisiana artists who represented the state at 60 festivals in more than 20 states and ten countries.

Artists from all musical genres are eligible to apply, but the events they attend must:

- be outside Louisiana
- be in at least their fourth years
- have had attendance of 10,000 or more in 2013.

Louisiana artists will receive at least \$1,000 per performance and may be sponsored multiple times until reaching a combined \$20,000 for the calendar year.

McKissick Museum requests entries for 2015 exhibition

McKissick Museum in Columbia, S.C., which has one of the largest collections of slave-made structures on any campus in the U.S., will commemorate the 150th anniversary of the end of the Civil War on April 9, 2015 with a major exhibition. The exhibition symbolically re-enacts the Civil War's end as a scene of reconciliation, not between the North and the South but between former slaves and former slave owners.

The museum is seeking entries from artists working in what historically have been regarded as craft-based media, such as clay, fiber, glass, metal and wood. These artists will imagine and give visual and sculptural form to this scene.

Purchase awards totaling \$25,000 will be given to prizewinning artists and/or artist collaboratives. The deadline to submit images is Oct. 31. Award-winning UL filmmaker promotes Cajun culture in China

Conni Castille, a documentary filmmaker and assistant director of the University of Louisiana at Lafayette's Moving Image Arts program, went to China in early April for a weeklong tour promoting Cajun culture.

The trip was organized by American Routes, a public radio show hosted by Nick Spitzer, a professor of anthropology at Tulane University. Stops included American Cultural Centers, U.S. consulates and clubs in Guangzhou, Harbin, Nanjing and Shanghai.

Castille showed and discussed two of her documentaries, I Always Do My Collars First, a film about ironing, and T National Endowment for the -Galop: A Louisiana Horse Story. Arts, New York Institute of

Collars uncovers family life and domestic rituals in Castille's and Mid Atlantic Arts Foundahometown of Breaux Bridge,

while *T-Galop* reveals the role of the horse in southwest Louisiana and includes an interview with famed jockey and Acadiana native Calvin Borel. The film was named Documentary Film of the Year by the Louisiana Endowment of the Arts in 2013.

Cajun band Jesse Lége, Joel Savoy and the Cajun Country Revival was also part of the tour. In addition to the films and musical performances, Spitzer conducted oral history workshops and gave lectures on French Louisiana culture.

The tour, which concluded April 12, received support from the U.S. State Department, the Technology, Tulane University tion.
